On Monday, September 26, 2016, the Orlando City Council met in City Council Chambers at City Hall for the second of two annual budget hearings. Mayor Buddy Dyer called the meeting to order at 5:01 P.M.

Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Dyer asked for a moment of silence to begin the meeting, after which he led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Determination of Quorum

Mayor Dyer took notice that all City Council members were present and a quorum was established.

(1) Adopting Final Millage Rate and Budget of the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017

Mayor Dyer announced that this is the second of two public hearings for the adoption of the Millage Rate and Budget for the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. At the first hearing held on September 15, 2016, City Council adopted the proposed Millage Rate and Tentative Budget. At this second hearing City Council will consider for adoption the final Millage Rate and final Budget.

City of Orlando Millage Rate Resolution

Interim City Clerk Amy T. Iennaco presented a Resolution of the City of Orlando, Florida, establishing the ad valorem tax levy (millage rate) upon the assessed real property and business personal property tax rolls of the year 2016. Mayor Dyer announced that the proposed Millage Rate for the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017 is 6.6500 mills, which is 6.43 percent higher than the rolled-back rate of 6.2484. Commissioner Patty Sheehan moved and Commissioner Robert F. Stuart seconded a motion to adopt the Millage Rate of the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. Mayor Dyer called on Deputy Chief Financial Officer Brian Battles, who presented brief comments on the proposed City of Orlando Millage Rate Resolution. On July 25, 2016 the City Council approved a millage rate of 6.65 per \$1000 valuation so that the appropriate filings could be made with the Property Appraiser by the August 1, 2016 deadline set for the TRIM notification process. The millage rate is within the parameters outlined by State formula, has not changed from the previous fiscal year or since the 1st Budget Hearing on September 15, 2016 and is set to maintain the City's current superior levels of service. Mayor Dyer opened the hearing for public comment and no one appeared to testify. Mayor Dyer closed the public comment portion of the hearing. City Council voted unanimously to adopt the Millage Rate of the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

City of Orlando Budget Resolution

Interim City Clerk Amy T. Iennaco presented a Resolution of the City of Orlando, Florida adopting the Annual Budget of the City of Orlando, Florida for the Fiscal Year beginning October 1, 2016 and ending September 30, 2017. Commissioner Tony Ortiz moved and Commissioner Regina I. Hill seconded a motion to adopt the Budget of the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. Mayor Dyer called on Deputy Chief Financial Officer Brian Battles, who

presented brief comments on the proposed City of Orlando Budget Resolution. The total proposed budget is approximately \$1.2 billion (\$1,171,130,190) including a General Fund budget of approximately \$425 million (\$424,050,709). Mr. Battles stated there have been no changes since the 1st Budget Hearing on September 15, 2016 and the Budget was attached as exhibits to this Resolution and the updated Budget in Brief and has been published on the Oity's website for over a week.

Mayor Dyer opened the hearing for public comment and the following person appeared to testify: Lawanna Gelzer, appearing on her own behalf, spoke about the budget entries reflecting actuals regarding soccer stadium funding.

Mayor Dyer closed the public comment portion of the hearing. Commissioner Robert F. Stuart, District 3, then read the following statement into the record: "As you know, I have served for many years as the Executive Director of the Christian Service Center for Central Florida. The budget for this year and for many years prior to my service on the City Council has included funds that provide a modest grant to the Center. The amount of that proposed funding for this year is \$25,000.00. None of that money goes toward the general operation of the Christian Service Center. These funds, however, will not be granted to the Christian Service Center unless and until the Christian Service Center and the City enter into a separate written agreement. Such agreement will come before City Council for individual approval at some point in the future. I want to make it clear that when this item comes before the City Council, I will abstain from voting on the funding agreement between the City and the Christian Service Center and will fill out the proper documentation noting this information." Hearing no further discussion on the motion, City Council voted unanimously to adopt the Budget of the City of Orlando for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

(2) Adopting Final Millage Rate and Budget of the Downtown Development Board (DDB) for Fiscal Year 2016/2017

Mayor Dyer announced that this is the second of two public hearings for the adoption of the Millage Rate and Budget for the Downtown Development Board (DDB) for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. At the first hearing held on September 15, 2016 City Council adopted the proposed Millage Rate and Tentative Budget. At this second hearing City Council will consider for adoption the final Millage Rate and Budget.

Downtown Development Board (DDB) Millage Rate Resolution

Interim City Clerk Amy T. Iennaco presented a Resolution of the City of Orlando, Florida establishing for the Downtown Development Board the ad valorem tax levy (millage rate) upon the assessed real property within the Downtown Development District of the Year 2016. Mayor Dyer announced that the proposed Millage Rate for the Downtown Development Board (DDB) Fiscal Year 2016/2017 is 1 Mill, which is 10.71 percent lower than the rolled-back rate of 1.1200. Commissioner Regina I. Hill moved and Commissioner Patty Sheehan seconded a motion to adopt the Downtown Development Board's Millage Rate for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. Mayor Dyer called on Deputy Chief Financial Officer Brian Battles, who presented brief comments on the proposed Downtown Development Board's Millage Rate. The City Council, on behalf of the DDB, has set a millage rate of \$1 per \$1,000 valuation. Similar to the City's millage rate, that rate was submitted to the Property Appraiser by the August 1, 2016 deadline for the TRIM notification process. The millage rate is within the parameters outlined by State formula, has not been changed from the prior fiscal year or since the 1st Budget Hearing on September 15, 2016 and is to support economic activity within the district. Mayor Dyer opened the hearing for public comment and no one appeared for public comment. Mayor Dyer closed the public comment portion of the hearing. City Council voted unanimously to adopt the Downtown Development Board (DDB) Millage Rate for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

Downtown Development Board (DDB) Budget Resolution

Interim City Clerk Amy T. Iennaco presented a Resolution of the City of Orlando, Florida adopting the Annual Budget of the Downtown Development Board for the Fiscal Year beginning October 1, 2016 and ending September 30, 2017. Commissioner Patty Sheehan moved and Commissioner Robert F. Stuart seconded a motion to adopt the Downtown Development Board's Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. Mayor Dyer called on Deputy Chief Financial Officer Brian Battles, who presented brief comments on the proposed Downtown Development Board budget. The total proposed budget for the DDB is approximately \$4.2 million (\$4,157,080). Mr. Battles stated there have been no changes since the 1st Budget Hearing on September 15, 2016 and the Budget was attached as exhibits to this Resolution and the updated Budget in Brief and has been published on the on the City's website for over a week. Mayor Dyer opened the hearing for public comment and no one appeared for public comment. Mayor Dyer closed the public comment portion of the hearing. City Council voted unanimously to adopt the Downtown Development Board's Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

(3) Adopting Final Millage Rate and Budget of the Downtown South Neighborhood Improvement District (DSNID) for Fiscal Year 2016/2017

At this second hearing City Council will consider for adoption the final Millage Rate and Budget.
